TOKYO HULA explores the phenomenal popularity of the hula dance in Japan from both Native Hawaiian and Japanese perspectives.

Synopsis

Today it is estimated there are nearly 2 million people dancing hula in Japan—a figure greater than the entire population of Hawai'i. With more people dancing hula in Japan than in Hawai'i where the native art was born, this explosive growth has created a multi-million dollar industry based on culture as commodity. But what motivates Japanese students and teachers to dance hula and how is it translated into a foreign culture? How do Native Hawaiians participate in this cross-cultural exchange?

Many Hawaiian master hula teachers, or kumu hula, have found it difficult to sustain their hula schools in Hawai'i. The same is true for many musical artists, cultural experts, and performers who must often work day jobs to pursue their passions and supplement their income on an island home many would consider paradise—but where the cost of living only continues to rise. Many have discovered that there are more opportunties across the Pacific Ocean in Japan where a hula boom continues to grow—and pay the bills.

In TOKYO HULA, an examination of tourism, economics, and a love for all things Hawaiian

fueling this cultural phenomenon is revealed by focusing on the personal stories of Japanese sensei who have started their own schools and Hawaiian kumu hula who are now living and teaching in Japan. The documentary follows teachers and students both in and outside of hula classes and competitions to better understand their daily lives, struggles, and challenges in practicing a cultural art form in a foreign host country.

By juxtaposing the two main subjects—
Japanese sensei Seiko Okamoto who is from
Japan but trained by the late revered Hawaiian
Kumu Hula Aloha Dalire and Hawaiian Kumu
Hula Lōpaka Igarta-DeVera who was entrusted by
Kumu Hula Sonny Ching to move to Japan to
open a branch of their school, the film illuminates
how the hula has become both big business as
well as an evolving global tradition that continues
to flourish in Japan.

TOKYO HULA is the final film in a trilogy of award-winning documentaries about the evolution of hula in the global world (NĀ KAMALEI: THE MEN OF HULA (2007) and AMERICAN ALOHA: HULA BEYOND HAWAI'I (2003)).



Director's Statement



Why do the Japanese love the hula dance so much? This simple question—which has perplexed many master hula teachers and practitioners alike—was the inspiration driving my first trip to Japan to explore the hula craze in 2009. Ten years later, the number of people dancing hula in Japan continues to grow—and the popularity of the hula continues to blossom around the globe.

As an independent filmmaker committed to sharing stories that highlight a Pacific perspective, I have been dedicated to creating feature length documentaries about the hula dance and Hawaiian culture since 1998. My first film, *AMERICAN ALOHA: HULA BEYOND HAWAI'I* (2003), followed three kumu hula (master hula teachers) in Los Angeles and the Bay Area of California

as they created communities centered on hula as a living tradition to connect new generations far from home to their heritage. For Hawaiians, the hula is not just a dance, but a way of life. And while many people may only know the stereotypes from old Hollywood movies and tourist kitsch, I have always been interested in trying to dispel the deep rooted misconceptions about the hula and Hawaiian culture often seen in mainstream media. My second film, NĀ KAMALEI: THE MEN OF HULA (2008), focused on the revival of men dancing the hula through capturing the journey of legendary master hula teacher Robert Cazimero and the only all-male school in Hawai'i as they prepared to compete in the world's largest hula festival. The third film I directed, ONE VOICE (2011), followed ten young Native Hawaiian high school students for a year as they prepared to compete in the annual Kamehameha Schools Song Contest to celebrate the revitalization of the Hawaiian language.

As a hula dancer, I can honestly say that the hula influences everything in my life. Through my hula lineage, I have been taught that the hula is the art of Hawaiian dance that expresses all that we hear, see, smell, taste, touch and feel. My film work continues to explore the hula as an evolving tradition in the modern world and the relationship between music, language and culture that ultimately expresses the heart of hula for me: storytelling.

Director/Producer Lisette Marie Kaualena Flanary

As an independent filmmaker and a hula dancer, Lisette Marie Flanary creates films that celebrate a modern renaissance of the hula dance and Hawaiian culture. She is the writer, producer and director of Lehua Films and her award-winning documentaries, AMERICAN ALOHA: HULA BEYOND HAWAI'I, NĀ KAMALEI: THE MEN OF HULA, and ONE VOICE have broadcast nationally on US public television and shown in film festivals around the world. AMERICAN ALOHA: HULA BEYOND HAWAI'I received a CINE Golden Eagle Award when it aired on the critically acclaimed P.O.V. series on PBS in 2003 and NĀ KAMALEI: THE MEN OF HULA. featuring legendary Hawaiian master hula teacher and entertainer. Robert Cazimero, broadcast nationally on the 2007-2008 Independent Lens series on PBS and was the winner of the Audience Award for the series. Lisette received the Hawai'i Filmmaker Award at the Hawai'i International Film Festival in 2007 and her films have received Best Documentary and Audience Awards at the San Francisco

International Asian American Film Festival, the Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival, and the San Diego Asian Film Festival. She directed the documentary feature ONE VOICE, produced by Pacific Islanders in Communications and Juniroa Productions, about the Kamehameha Schools Song Contest that broadcast on PBS in 2012 and also received a limited theatrical release in Japan and Hawai'i. Lisette was nominated for an Emerging Director Award at the Los Angeles Asian Pacific Film Festival in 2010 and ONE VOICE won Audience Awards for Best Documentary at the Hawai'i International Film Festival, the San Diego Asian Film Festival, and the San Francisco International Asian Film Festival in 2011. In 2016, ONE VOICE was a 25 in 25 Honoree celebrating the 25th anniversary of Pacific Islanders in Communications.

Lisette is a graduate of New York University's Tisch School of the Arts in Film and Television Production and received her MFA in Creative Writing at the New School University. Having lived in New York City for over twenty years, Lisette joined the faculty of the Academy for Creative Media at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa in 2011. She is an Associate Professor of Native/Indigenous Creative Media and received the Board of Regents' Medal for Excellence in Teaching in 2016.

Associate Producer Hatsumi Asaka

Hatsumi Asaka became an independent TV producer and moved to New York in 1992 after extensive experience in Japanese TV production. She began producing TV programs for NHK in 1995 where she covered the PGA Tour and produced MLB magazine shows until she shifted her field to news stories and documentaries in 2006. Asaka produced the NHK General TV New York segment of the morning news show, OHAYO NIPPON, for 6 years and also produced a series of interviews with female executives in the U.S. entitled STAR WOMEN, including Marillyn Hewson, CEO of Lockheed Martin and Jean Afterman, senior vice president of New York Yankees.

In 2016, Asaka became a Program Director for the interview program, DIRECT TALK, on NHK World-Japan, the English-language channel, which reaches more than 300 million households in 160 countries and regions. She is also producing a weekly live show, @NYC for an international news program, CATCH! WORLD TOP NEWS (NHK BS-1).



Editor Kyung Lee

Kyung Lee is an editor and a filmmaker based in the San Francisco Bay Area. She is a Japanese native of Korean descent who is currently editing Lisette Marie Flanary's latest documentary, TOKYO HULA. Previous editing work includes co-editing BIG JOY: THE ADVENTURES OF JAMES BROUGHTON (2013 SXSW, Tribeca, Frameline, Mill Valley Film Festivals) and OTTOMATICAKE (2017 Hawaii International Film Festival). She made her directorial debut with TELOS: THE FANTASTIC WORLD OF EUGENE TSSUI (2014), a portrait of a visionary Bay Area architect. The film has been screened at film festivals worldwide and is currently being broadcast nationally on PBS.Kyung is also currently editing multiple documentary films; HOMECOMING, (Director: Gemma Cubero del Barrio), QUBA! (Directed by Kim Anno), and MR. IMMORTAL JELLYFISH MAN (Directed by Dicky Dahl).



Cultural Advisor/Post Consultant Kumu Hula Patrick Makuakāne

Patrick Makuakāne (Kumu Hula) is a creative force in the hula world, and is well known for his innovative choreography. His work is grounded in the traditions and fundamentals of hula, and he labors to keep traditional dances intact as they have been for generations. He has also developed a unique style of hula (called hula mua) that uses modern music to provide a whole new dimension to the poetry of hula. Born and raised in Honolulu, Hawai'i, Mr. Makuakāne began dancing at the age of 13 and went on to study with some of Hawai'i's most recognized hula masters, including John Keola Lake and Robert Cazimero.

In 2000, he began intensive traditional studies with hula master Mae Kamāmalu Klein in Hawai'i and. after three years, achieved the recognized status of kumu hula (hula master). This achievement culminated in a traditional 'uniki 'ailolo graduation ceremony and connects Mr. Makuakāne to a hula lineage stretching back for generations. His studies were made possible by funding from a prestigious two-year Irvine Fellowship in Dance. Mr. Makuakāne has received numerous awards for his choreography, including several Isadora Duncan Dance Awards.

Brian K. Wilcox has been in the film and television industry for over thirty years, with work ranging from documentaries to made-for-television series. Brian began his career as a camera operator and technical director at KUTV Channel 2 in Salt Lake City. Most recently, Brian was the cinematographer for the awardwinning documentary, ONE VOICE, which was executive produced by Pacific Islanders in Communications and THE SOUL OF KALAUPAPA: VOICE OF EXILE (2011). He has also worked as an adjunct faculty member at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah.
